THE CO-CREATION CONFERENCE OF 2021

The Co-Creation Conference of 2021, “Engaging in Knowledge Translation Together” is organised for the second time by Share-Net International and this year it is being hosted by Share-Net Bangladesh. The conference will take place from 25th to 28th of January and the 3rd of February 2021 on a digital platform giving people all around the world the opportunity to join.

This innovative, dynamic event will be a working conference where participants will develop concrete and evidence-informed knowledge products that will be used for influencing policy and practice at the national and global level.

OVERVIEW OF THE THEME: SRHR FOR ADOLESCENTS AND YOUTH

The second edition of the Co-Creation Conference will evolve around the theme of “SRHR for Adolescents and Youth”. In the run-up to the conference, an international and national Community/ies of Practice on SRHR for Adolescents and Youth was established consisting of Share-Net International members and partners. A youth-led consultancy team conducted a narrative review, evidence brief and deliberative dialogues with key informants to advise the kind of products that will be developed during the conference.

Adolescents and young people consistently lack access to sexual and reproductive health information and services (Engel et al., 2019). Adolescents and young women have the same right to control their bodies as adults and need to receive information, counseling, and access to the full range of modern contraceptive options. The adolescent SRH challenges are currently recognised through Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) number 3, which aims to eradicate HIV infections and provide universal access to sexual and reproductive health services as well as incorporating such services into national strategies.

OBJECTIVES OF CCC 2021

This is a working conference to develop knowledge products used for influencing policy and practice at global and country levels. All participants (incl. researchers, practitioners and policy makers) engage in dialogues and are part of creating knowledge products on the main thematic track 'Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) for Adolescents and Youth'.

Specific objectives of the conference:

1. **Present state of the art;** knowledge and evidence around SRHR for Adolescents and Youth
2. **Identify areas for change** and the kind of products and processes that are needed to improve policies and/or programmes
3. Develop **outlines for knowledge products** together with SRHR experts, writers, media specialists and visual designers.
4. Analyse if the language used and framing of the messages will **reach the target audience**
5. Develop **action plans** for different countries and settings on how to influence the change processes.
6. **Launch the SNI small grants** round 2021, that will focus on implementation of these action plans

METHODOLOGY

The Share-Net International Co-Creation Conference's methodology is new in its kind and a range of methodologies are used. Methods include deliberative dialogues, message and product development techniques, write shops, framing messages and language use and several others.

In different trajectories participants will work in 8 groups on knowledge products. Peer review, reflection and discussion sessions will be alternated by writing and producing the products. In each trajectory there will be a facilitator leading the process. In total there will be 10 facilitators of which 2 are in the lead will facilitate the co-creation process in the group. During the day, the work will be divided by starting with plenary and group work sessions. Inspiring guests will deliver power talks on the theme of SRHR for Adolescents and Youth.

During the conference, a small grants call will be launched on the final day that will lead to the use of the products at the country level.
